Medicaid Provider Assessment - AHCA/NCAL

Medicaid patients without putting the viability of their facilities at risk Medicaid fails to fully reimburse hospitals, doctors and long term care facilities the total cost required to care for patients Nursing centers lose nearly \$20 a day for each Medicaid resident, resulting in about a \$63 billion loss in 2011

Reasons for Private Health Insurers to Advocate for a ...

Expanding Medicaid would result in lower coverage costs and a more stable private insurance market, which would benefit insurers who are only participating in the private market In a state that fails to expand Medicaid, some people who would have otherwise received Medicaid will instead be uninsured Others will manage to purchase
